

each other to make changes in our lifestyle.... some small, some more significant.... which really can make a difference.

So each month in the magazine we'll be giving you some Eco-tips focussed on a particular theme, with updates on how we're doing in our journey to become an Eco Church and get that Bronze award!



# **APRIL ECO TIPS: WASTE**

The decisions we make about what to buy, what to discard and how to dispose of items are really important. The UK produced 27.8 million tonnes of household waste in 2014, of which 44.9% was recycled.

**REDUCE** ...your carbon footprint: visit <u>www.footprint.wwf.org.uk</u> to calculate your footprint & find ways to reduce it.

... what you buy. Studies show that we're happier when we place less emphasis on material possessions. Think before you buy! Do you really need it? Could you borrow/hire what you need instead?

**REUSE** Try to use less 'disposable' products and use washable ones instead. Many of the things we might throw away can still be useful!

**RECYCLE**These can all go in your green bin after being rinsed out:Drypaper & cardboardPlastic bottles, tubs & trays (inc detergentbottles)Metal food tins & drinks cansGlass bottles & jarsClean aluminiumfoil & traysPlastic & metal lids (put back on bottles and jars)

These can be tied in a carrier bag and will be collected with your normal bincollection:Small electrical items (inc batteries)Clothingpairs of shoestowelssheets.

**These can go in your food waste bin:** All cooked & uncooked food waste. No liquids though & no packaging.

It is all anaerobically digested & used to generate electricity, heat & transport fuel. It also makes bio-fertilizer, which is used in farming and land regeneration.

The following can be recycled at Dorking Community Recycling Centre, Ranmore Rd:

Fruit juice & food cartons Print cartridges Garden waste Electrical waste.

I need to start with a huge thank you to all the team behind this new Westcott Village Magazine. You have driven this project with a passion and the dedication to ensure it reaches everyone has been massively appreciated. I know your efforts will be inspiring others to get involved.

#### WESTCOTT NEIGHBOURHOOD **DEVELOPMENT PLAN**

Hopefully everyone has seen the latest draft of the Westcott Neighbourhood Development Plan. If not, please take a look at westcottvillageforum.com - by the time you read this, the plan will be with Mole Valley District Council as they take on the statutory next steps. The most recent actions from the volunteer 82.6% of Westcott residents hold a UK group in the village have been to consult with folks such as the Surrey Hills UK. #### WESTCOTT – The facts and the figures

So what does a typical Westcott household look like? The latest census tells us, on average there are 2.46 people living in the home, sharing 1.62 cars (or vans). Compared to the rest of Surrey we have more children and more under 5 and are more likely to be living detached or semi-detached.

We have better educational achievement, better access to social rented accommodation and we see fewer instances of anti-social behaviour. It's not all good news though as there are more instances of domestic violence here than on average in Surrey.

#### DOMESTIC ABUSE

The contrast to the earlier point on Domestic Violence rates should not be lost. Domestic Abuse is any incident or village pattern of incidents of controlling, threatening behaviour,



16 or over who are, or have been, intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality. It arises from the misuse of power & control by one person over another. It is rarely a one-off event, but tends to escalate in frequency and severity over time.

#### Do you know the signs of an unhealthy relationship?



Abuse in the home is more widespread than you think. It affects men & women of all ages, ethnicities, orientations and income levels, regardless of ability. It is not easy to accept that a loved one can behave so aggressively and because you cannot explain the behaviour, you assume that it is your fault. You are not to blame for your partner's behaviour. Everyone has the right to live life free from threats, violence and abuse and help is available.

East Surrey Domestic Abuse Services is an independent charity providing outreach and associated services across Mole Valley. They offer a confidential listening service to anyone affected by domestic abuse and violence and can aive practical advice about your legal position and can put you in touch with solicitors who are experienced in domestic abuse issues. They can also:

advise you on your housing options

help you apply for any benefits that you may be entitled to

needs

arrange transport if you wish to leave vour home

put you in touch with other caring agencies and sources of help and

attend appointments with you if you wish talk to you on the phone or meet you face to face to discuss any concerns that you may have about your relationship

#### DON'T BIFFA BIN LORRY

May I add just a word of caution, particularly for Mondays and Fridays I guess. Across Mole Valley, there have been a few instances of drivers taking to the pavements to get round the Biffa bin lorry.

You might want to know that Biffa and Surrey Police have joined forces to protect pedestrians from this danger and Biffa staff are likely to report any drivers who can face attending an educational driving course costing £90 or if the course is refused, points can be added to their licence. In the worst cases, offending drivers could face prosecution.

I'm conscious that our tight village roads make bin day a challenge, so please take extra care and give yourself a little extra time – all this means that if you ask the Biffa team to move their lorry to let you through then they should be only too pleased to help!

Westcott Village Association is delighted to be a part of this new Westcott Village Magazine. We will be contributing each month on issues of interest to village residents.

We are a Residents Association, founded in 1974, as Westcott does not have a Parish Council. We work with the district and county councils and we try to obtain the best service for the village. If any of you have any suggestions do contact us on the website.

The Reading Room and The Hut provide contrasting but overlapping services and St John's provides its own separate but distinct role. As an Association we have had discussions with the three managements. All are very content with their aims for the future which we support.

There have been losses to village facilities and there is considerable concern about the future character of Westcott as a distinct entity with its own character. We hope that the Westcott Village Magazine will provide a forum for discussing ideas and exchanging views. Action is required and time may not be on our side.

Following the retirement of Harry and Naina Chavads after twenty-eight years running Balchins Stores and the Post Office, the Committee of the Westcott Village Association presented them with a print of Westcott. This was painted by Susie West, a Leatherhead artist.

A second restricted parking bay has been approved by Surrey County Council Highways to be located outside Westcott Newsagents. It is important that the time limits are observed, otherwise passing traffic will not stop and local shops will suffer loss of trade.



We have a group of Street Stewards who collect subscriptions and distribute a Spring Newsletter and we would welcome more volunteers so that we can cover all parts of the village.

# WESTCOTT LOCAL HISTORY GROUP



#### New Year's Next Day Walk

Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> January was a fine, if cloudy, day but there had been heavy rain over the weekend. Some 60 people and assorted dogs set out from the Reading Room heading down Westcott Street and across the Cradhurst Recreation Ground to the Springfield Bridge across the Pippbrook and up the bank on the other side towards Ranmore. The mud on the path was becoming serious and before long some large pools of water had to be negotiated. After the railway crossing the walk turned west through the Land Barn Farm field (courtesy of loan of key to gate) and thence along the concrete lane to Hole Hill.

This led back to the secret destination at Springfield Farm for the traditional 'mulled wine and mince pies' ably provided by the WLHG volunteers. The WLHG is very grateful to Mike and Jill Flower for making their yard available for the occasion.

#### The History and Records of Mental Health Care in Surrey 1700 – ca.1980. Talk by Julian Pooley, the Senior Archivist at Surrey History Centre in Woking.

Julian Pooley has been at the Surrey History Centre for nearly 30 years and obviously enjoys his occupation delving into records going back to the 12<sup>th</sup> century with 6 miles of shelving.

These records reveal the changes in provision of mental health care from the 1700's right through the Victorian era. In earlier days ca. 1774 – 1813 there were licensed houses for mental health care in Surrey. As time went on the Victorians built huge asylums in Surrey with incredible style to accommodate patients from far and wide. Asylum records that Pooley illustrated described people with dementia, imbecility, idiocy, mania and melancholy, palsy and chronic alcoholism at all ages for both men and women.

It seems that the Victorians were 'compassionate carers' seeking always to occupy and train their charges. Pooley illustrated patients doing agricultural work in the extensive fields of the asylum, in particular harvesting which gave people fresh air and exercise. Women were more usually occupied with laundry and sewing. This was the therapy that would help patients return to normal life in the community in that era. The institutions were largely self-supporting in staff terms. The object was to rebuild the patient's self-esteem and to give them an opportunity of training for a new occupation. Music was an important part of institutional life both for listening and for participation, all helping people recover their lives.

Guildford Road, Westcott, 0 Dorking, Surrey, RH4 3QE Pooley displayed illustrations of a number of the great institutes – Brookwood with 150 acres held 650 people until 1948, Great Fosters is now a country house hotel, at Earlswood Common, Redhill Asylum for Idiots was built in 1862, and Holloway Sanatorium at Virginia Water held some 200 people of "reduced middle class".

In many cases funds were raised for special cases sponsored by celebrated personalities in the establishment. On the technical front attempts were made to establish indexes of various facial characteristics or behaviour, namely – expression, distance between the eyes, shape of chin and nose. However there were many examples of people quite simply knitting or reading at one moment and throwing the furniture around in the next moment.

It was impressive how well these institutions were kept with their large public rooms contrasting with rather crowded sleeping quarters. Pooley and his team made great efforts to recover records from buildings that were being demolished and found heaps of disorganised records in rooms still smelling of antiseptics. Surrey have the best records in the country.

There was no meeting in February and the next meeting on Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> March with a talk by Margaret Richardson about "Lutyens in Surrey" will be reported in a later edition. Lutyens is often linked with Gertrude Jekyll in some of his Arts& Crafts designs for houses and gardens. 'Goddards' in Abinger Lane is one such and the WLHG plans a visit there on **Tuesday 13<sup>th</sup> June**. Margaret Richardson is one of the founding members of the Lutyens Trust and was joint editor of the Lutyens Exhibition Catalogue. The website Lutyens Trust has a gallery of photos of his buildings and the war memorials for which he is famous.

The annual Good Friday Walk is planned for **15<sup>th</sup> April** and more will be announced nearer the date.



# WESTCOTT READING ROOM



## The New Reading Room

There has been a Reading Room on the present site for the last 140 years.

Mrs Maria Fuller of Rokefield purchased the land at auction in 1874 and in 1877 Mrs Fuller and her sisters Miss Julia Elizabeth Barclay and Miss Emily Barclay had a Reading Room built on the site, for the "recreation and benefit" of the village and in 1892 endowed it to a Trust together with  $\pounds$ 1,500 of Railway Stock for its upkeep.

In the 1960s the building was showing its age and was in urgent need of repair, but lacked the funds. At the time, Holy Trinity was in need of a church hall and agreed to replace the building and the PCC assumed responsibility for its management. The old building was demolished and a new one built at a cost of £8,500 with a car park created on land that had been the kitchen garden of the caretaker's house "Draycote". In 1993 the church no longer felt the need for a hall and relinquished its control to a new management of village residents.

The existing building is 50 years old this year and like the original is showing its age, with potentially expensive refurbishment likely to be required in the near future, prompting the management to consider the best way forward.

Rather than wasting money on escalating repair costs it has been agreed to take the opportunity to replace the building, with updated facilities, to reflect the existing and future needs for the "recreation and benefit" of the village in a single building. The primary aim being to increase available booking opportunities (currently regular weekly bookings result in over 90% usage on weekdays outside school holidays, while attracting fewer bookings at the weekends).

#### Requirements for the new building

The following needs have been identified:

- 1. The new building should be an attractive addition to the village it represents.
- 2. Significantly increased booking opportunities with the main hall designed for a greater range of activities and provision of a bright, modern, welcoming space, for celebrations and receptions to attract additional weekend bookings.

The new proposed building will have a main hall with a sprung floor, increased ceiling height for sports such as badminton, demountable staging and large drop-down screen, up-dated audio system and increased storage.

Two additional rooms will be provided each with independent access of the other and the main hall. A meeting room with a drop-down screen and AFTER THE TEMPLES AND FORTS, MEET THE REAL RAJASTHAN IN NARLAI.

## Westcott Reading Room Governance

The Governing Document or constitution of the Westcott Reading Room Trust has been the Indenture dated 11 March 1892 by which the land and buildings were bequeathed to the village with two Holding Trustees, who were empowered to delegate the basic management to a committee. That is how it has been run over very many years.

In the last year or so the Charity Commission has recommended that Charities should transfer their Property Deeds to the Official Custodian for Charities and that the traditional Trustees and management committees should work together. The terms of the original Indenture have been overtaken by modern requirements and the recommendations of the Charity Commission.

Furthermore it has become necessary to legalize the protection against personal financial liability for the formal Trustees and others involved in the management of the Trust.

For these reasons the Trustees have drawn up, with legal advice, a new constitution to replace the old Indenture which is called a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) as provided by the Charities Act. This new form of constitution has the important benefit of obviating the individual

financial liability of Trustees amongst other things. Trustees are obliged always to act in concert for all decisions concerning the Trust.



The present long serving Trustees are Roger Christian and Ja-

net Phillips. With the introduction of the new CIO, four additional Trustees are being enlisted who will only be asked to serve for a limited period of between one and three years and be free to stand again if they wish. It is hoped that in future responsible members of the village will be more willing to volunteer as Trustees of the Reading Room Trust under these new terms in the CIO constitution.

As the Reading Room Trust plans for a replacement building are reaching the stage of fund raising it is very important to have watertight governance before starting to commit funds. In addition the regular users of the Reading Room are being encouraged to play a part in the practical management of the building and to offer their views on the proposed new design.

It is expected to hold a General Meeting at the Reading Room in the near future in order to formally announce the rebuild project and the new constitution. The overall project is expected to take several years but we have to get going now on identifying the funds required.

# The past is a foreign country; they do things differently there.

"We didn't need to venture out of the village for our daily needs; in any event no one had a car. Along the village, the Parton brothers had the fish shop some fish-heads for the cat and a pint of shrimps for tea.

Miss Johnson owned the drapers for essential underwear, stockings and socks, needlework requisites and stationery, and "Constance" the hairdresser next door did all our cutting and crimping. On the corner was Forrest Stores for groceries, and across the road was Tunnell's Dairy for milk, eggs, cream etc.

Coal was delivered from a big lorry. The coal-man hoisted black one-hundredweight sacks onto his back, walked up the path and round the back, and tipped them into the coal-store. "Merry" Aldred lived up to his name as, despite being black all over from the coal dust, he always had a cheery word and smile for everyone. Rent was collected weekly by the landlord, and a young insurance man regularly rode up on his bicycle and often came in for a cup of tea to check if there was any more insurance he could sell us!

"Nobby" Dixon loaded up his horse and cart with greengrocery and served it from the back, with his old nag stopping every few paces so the customers could catch up with him.

At the end of the day, the horse was put out into the buttercup field at the back of his house in St .John's Road. "Wag" Dixon was a senior brother and he had a lorry with a long base where the boxes of fish were displayed, and a `nice bit of cod' or a couple of herrings could be weighed and sold on the spot. If you couldn't get out for your shopping, there were many deliveries.

Balchins (the butcher, not the grocer) excelled in bacon and other breakfast necessities and, round the corner was White's, another butcher who made sausages while you waited and whatever cut of meat you desired would be sawn from a carcass in front of you...and a nice juicy bone for the dog thrown in!

A garage which would repair your bicycle, a newsagent who delivered, four pubs, The Hut for social events, a library in the Reading Room and the postman called three times a day". A narrow life, perhaps, without cars or telephones, but is today any better? Those who recall 'the old days' and note the number of vacant shops in the village at present may well wonder.

This is Olince. She is the enthusiastic book keeper of a new savings group with has 45 members at the Tabor Hill Church in the town of Sentani on the coast of Papua Province in Indonesia. Many women in the congregation make money for their families selling vegetables in the market but they felt that they could never progress as the money



they earned ran out very quickly. They could never grow their business or afford school and health costs. In September of 2016 Papua Partners, working together with our partner YAPELIN facilitated discussions and training with a small group of women from the congregation on how to use and manage money. The group of women who attended the workshop immediately decided to set up their own saving group. They meet once every week and lodge their savings and have committed that they won't take any money out for at least a year. The initial group of 20 has grown to 45 and they have now saved an equivalent of 4,500 pounds. Several of the women have been able to start new businesses such as selling petrol due to better weekly management and planning for the use of their money.

One of Beethoven's greatest quartets, op.130 in B flat, a powerful work in six movements, will provide the final work from the Piatti quartet.

There is one opera screening at the Dorking Halls, a recording of Puccini's Madame Butterfly from the Royal Opera. This is a tragic tale of love betrayed, told through Puccini's powerful and highly emotional music. There are also three ballet screenings. It encourages self-discipline you have to turn up on time for a match and you have to wear the correct uniform.

To be honest, we have all been to school so there shouldn't be too much of a problem here but will playing bowls be like going back to school (alarming and embarrassing)? Not unless your school allowed you to drink beer during a match and to stay on afterwards in the clubhouse to enjoy pleasant company without the worry of having to rush off to do your homework. This, of course, doesn't apply to members of school age!

Fitness helps moderately improve muscle strength (arm, shoulder, leg muscles), flexibility and endurance

Creating windows of opportunity



Social interaction helps improve social skills and being part of a team also gives you a sense of belonging

If your favourite pastime is solitaire or bodybuilding, then perhaps the camaraderie of bowls won't suit. There's no doubt that once the quiet heat of battle is over, opposing teams retire to the clubhouse for friendly cakes and ale, cheery captains' speeches and good humoured conversation.

Increases skills – bowls involves some element of problem solving skills and also helps improve coordination and concentration

One set of "problems" to solve are the rules. At first, they seem complicated but there are at least two people in the club who understand "Bowls England – Rules and Regulations 2013 ed." almost in their entirety. The main thing is that other players are friendly and supportive, even though they may be on the opposing team. And it's certainly true that quiet concentration over a few hours of play can induce a pleasant Zen-like tiredness.

Sunshine and showers

April is a month of unfolding bud, of warmth and cold, sunshine and showers. The month's title is thought to come from the Latin 'aperire', a word which describes the opening of leaf. Another theory holds that since months are often named for gods and goddess and since Aphrilis is derived from the Greek "Aphrodite," one can surmise that the month was named for the Greek goddess of love, whom the Romans called Venus. 'March winds and April showers bring forth May flowers' is a commonly used old proverb.

According to the Met Office, 'At this time of year in the UK we are in a transition period between the long, cold (well sometimes) winter months, and the warmer spring and summer. The jet stream starts to move northwards, which can bring the first signs of warmth, but also tends to make our weather more unsettled due to low pressure systems being driven towards the UK, and so we get rain, showers and strong wind.

But it isn't just low pressure that results in showers; they can also develop due to daytime heating. At this time of year, the sea temperature around the UK is at its lowest, meanwhile the heating we receive from the sun is increasing as the sun rises higher in the sky and daylight hours increase. This results in warm land temperatures compared with sea temperatures, and so shower clouds develop preferentially over the warmer land.'

#### **Dancing Adders**

In April, the male adder actively seeks out a potential mate. This mate searching activity can be frantic, with male adders patrolling at speed, searching for pheromone trails. When they find a female the male flicks his tongue along her back and sides, both snakes vibrate their tails and the male moves along her back and follows her movements. After mating the male will sometimes remain coiled around the female.

The males are very territorial and if another male tries to move in there may be a 'dance of the adders'. Obviously, they're not really dancing; it's more a duel, a way of establishing who's superior without being injured. The snakes never attempt to bite each other.

The two snakes raise half their bodies off the ground in an attempt to push their rival down. This maybe done belly to belly or back to back or they may become entwined together. The pair topple to the ground and then rise again several times. They continue wrestling coiled around each other and moving from side to



side. Should you be lucky enough to witness this graceful spectacle, it is an event you will never forget. I've only ever seen it once in the 8 years I've been at Landbarn but it was indeed unforgettable.

The winner of the fight is almost always the larger and stronger snake. Sometimes the winning male will stay with the female for several days and mate with her several times.

#### **Dogs and Adders**

Dogs are occasionally bitten by adders; although the bites are painful they are very rarely fatal.

Adders are quite timid in nature and will not usually bite unless they feel threatened or cornered. They prefer to move on if given the chance to do so. Due to their inquisitive nature, dogs can sometimes disturb adders whilst exploring undergrowth making them susceptible to being bitten.

Our advice is to keep to paths, have your dog under close control, avoid scrub edges and long grass between March and October.

If your pet is bitten by an adder (or you suspect that it may have been), you should keep your dog calm and seek prompt veterinary attention. Most adder bites result in pain and inflammation around the muzzle, where bites usually occur. Vets in our area where adders occur, are generally experienced in treating pets that have received bites.
